It was lovely to see people walking or cycling around the village to the different addresses picking a bargain or two on the way.

General feedback from the event was not so much about how much money people raised personally or for a number of good causes, but the feeling that we were getting back the community spirit in Holland on Sea, after a long time of not being able to mix with our neighbours. One comment from a resident was, they had the best day, getting to know their neighbours since they moved in 18 months ago.

The event raised £270 for HRA funds.

# Do Join Me for a Drink

In the 19th century, when Little Holland was just a small settlement of, primarily, farm houses one such property, a farm cottage belonging to Bennetts Farm, became the beer house. It was situated close to the border of Great Clacton and acquired the name The Princess Helena.

One of the earliest landlords was William Cole who was followed by Fleetwood Codd, he transferred the licence to Joseph Gould – a carpenter of Little Holland but Codd was no scholar and simply signed his name with a fancy cross; the licence subsequently transferring to Frederick

Gould. It was a modest establishment serving a very small community at the time, but was a meeting place for the inhabitants of Little Holland.

In 1900, when David Cripps Preston purchased the large area of land that small community at the time, but was a meeting place for the inhabitants of Little Holland.

In 1900, when David Cripps Preston purchased the large area of land that was to make-up Holland on Sea he planned to see a hotel being built as the starting block for development in the area; providing visitor accommodation to those interested in investing in potential building plots (now drawn-up on paper, along with appropriate roads).

A suitable site, on the corner of Kings Parade and Kings Avenue was identified but attracted no interest from potential buyers when first put up for sale. Later Samuel Newstead, who owned the

Carlton Restaurant in Clacton, put in a successful bid and work began on the building. By now The Princess Helena had been purchased by the Bury St. Edmunds brewers Greene King who put in an objection when an application was submitted for an alcohol license for the partly built hotel. Greene King's argument was that with so few houses having been built on the new estates any further licenses issued for selling alcohol would threaten the viability of The Princess Helena. Greene King's objection proved successful, and further applications were repeatedly contested by the brewery and always won the day. This resulted in the building of the hotel coming to a grinding halt; that is until 1925, a guarter of a century after the very first application had been refused.

Sadly any celebrations were short-lived as Newstead passed away and the half-built hotel lay abandoned. Despite attempts to market the now deteriorating site it took four years to find a new buyer, and ironically it was Greene King that became the owner in 1930; two years later The King's Cliff Hotel was opened for business.

Meanwhile the Princess Helena had received a number of improvements and extensions, the last being in 1933. By this time Little Holland had seen a significant growth in residential development and had changed its name to Holland on Sea; Little Holland on Sea being perceived as being too much of a mouthful.

In 1935 The Princess Helena was demolished and the current public house was built, and at the same time it acquired a new name – The Roaring Donkey. Since that time there have been many suggestions as to why it acquired this new name, which is the only one in the country, although readers of the Arthur Ransome "Swallows and Amazons" series of books will be aware of such a fictitiously named pub appearing in "The Big Six", on the Norfolk Broads. In 1958 local historian Denis Kennell recorded that many older inhabitants told the story of a carrier who used to work with a donkey and cart around Holland, and he would call into the Princess Helena for a midday pint. No sooner had he finished it than his donkey would start braying and he had to go out, so never allowing him the chance of a second pint.

During the 1930's and through to the 1950's the licensee of the Roaring Donkey was John Bloomfield and his wife, and his understanding was that there was a blacksmith nearby who owned an old jack ass that used to start roaring at around 3:00 p.m. every day. Local resident of that time, Mr Kerford-Byrnes, stated that every night a donkey, which was tethered in a field behind, used to bray and most of the people in the village used to call the Princes Helena 'the pub next to the roaring donkey'.

The late Group Captain Ray Howard of Holland on Sea, who was the great grandson of Joseph Gould, related how his grandfather ran bathing huts on the beach by the pier and had a number of donkeys to give children rides along the beach. The donkeys were brought back to the Princes Helena each evening and kept in a small holding. One of the donkeys, however, had a very loud bray and its braying used to echo across the marshes and fields to Great Clacton and Great Holland, particularly first thing in the morning.

The local people used to rely on the braying to wake them up and would rise with the words 'There goes the roaring donkey'; it was not long before the menfolk, going out for a pint, used to say to their wives 'I am going to see the roaring donkey'.

For some decades the Roaring Donkey and The King's Cliff were the only two

public houses in the village but in 1962 The Oakwood Inn opened its doors as a public house. Originally the farmhouse of Kents Farm, and subsequently a private residence – Oakwood Hall, occupied by Major W. W. Williams had become the Oakwood Hall Guest House until the early 1960's, with a very attractive tea garden. Then, in the swinging 60's it was converted into a public house.

Those who have known the village for a good many years might recall that the Roaring Donkey and the King's Cliff were always externally painted with cream walls and white window-frames and both boasted substantial flagpoles from which a yellow flag would fly with the name of the relevant establishment picked out in green letters; all this adding to the attractiveness of Holland on Sea in the 1950's and 60's.

# Forgotten Gifts

When I was a small girl my parents gifted me a book titled 'Wildlife on your doorstep'. It was a guide to the wildlife of our towns and cities first published in 1986. I remember it was one of my cherished possessions. Of course I'd carefully written my name all over the inside cover in case my brothers borrowed the book or it ever journeyed to school to be proudly presented at show and tell! It wasn't a children's book but I loved browsing through the beautiful glossy photographs and learning all about the plants and animals presented within. These days the book sits on a shelf gathering dust. It's seen better days. The edges are worn and some of the pages are stained with tea and pen marks. I took it down a few days ago and read the section on hedgehogs. The photo of a mother hog leading her babies (known as hoglets) greeted me like an old friend. I read the facts about their life cycles, behaviours, favourite foods, hiding places. Did you know for example, young are born with only around 100 spines? Adults have between 3000 - 7000 spines. Amazing. We already knew much about these little

creatures by the time this book was written. They had relatively few natural predators and weren't particularly shy, so as long as you were willing to go out at night, track and observe them you could learn a lot.

The children's writer, illustrator, and natural scientist Beatrix Potter perfectly captured their spirit in the twinkling eyes of her beloved character Mrs Tiggy-Winkle.

In contrast, sadly we knew almost nothing of the detrimental impact we were already having on hedgehogs back in the 80's and were woefully unprepared for their sudden demise over the next three decades.



The author touched on human caused risks such as poisoning from pesticides and slug pellets but at the time links between chemical use and hedgehog mortality hadn't been widely studied. Hedgehogs were well established in our towns. The chapter ended with:

"Their willingness to live in man-dominated environments means that they are not threatened by the march of progress, characterised by the urban sprawl... When so many species are threatened with decline and possible extinction today, it's reassuring to know that hedgehogs will be an endearing feature of gardens and other man-made habitats far into the future, just as they are now"

How wrong we were. We'd neglected to see the harm being inflicted on our spiny friends. Just like a familiar book, we thought they'd always be there beside us, but populations were already frayed at the edges. We'd taken for granted their adaptability to our concrete world. The pace of change was just too great. It's simply unfair to assume they'll continue to adapt. Unless we make space for nature, a precious gift, only their photos will be the remaining cherished memories our children take to show and tell.


#### Post Lockdown Gathering for members

For those who have visited the Kennedy Way Medical Centre I'm sure you will agree how wonderful the new facilities are and what an improvement they are compared to the old sites of Frinton Road and Epping Close.

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




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


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# Parliament Update

Dear Holland-on-Sea residents,

I thought that for this issue, I would open up the records from my post bag from the last few months and summarise the most topical issues that people have written to me about; e-scooters, immigration, and the future post Covid.

Before I start, let me again welcome the record of our local NHS and Tendring District Council. We come out of this pandemic in a robust manner thanks to their amazing efforts.

Firstly, let's talk about e-scooters. Let me say, I do understand local concern! As you know, there is a period of trial and reflection.

I will await the outcome without prejudice, however, I am well aware of the issues they pose and will require some convincing that this is a good move. It should be borne in mind that there was a time when the motor car was regarded with suspicion and they made a man walk with a red flag in front!

As an aside, I visited Tallinn in Estonia a couple of years ago. There they are well advanced in the acceptance of e-travel – everything from lorries to scooters. After some teething troubles, they seem to have achieved great success. The city is now a very clean place with remarkably few cars and very low emissions. The scooters there are generally confined to special lanes and are highly regulated. I fully realise that there are major infrastructure differences, but these could be overcome so, as far as I'm concerned, the jury's still out.

Turning to immigration and the illegal boat crossings, I know how much people want to see this mess come to and end. As promised, we have already legislated for a new tougher "points based" immigration system, to tighten the system up.

It is certainly right to say illegal immigration is a momentous issue, and I am reassured that this issue is being very robustly focused on by the Home Secretary. But that should not obscure the fact that this issue is complex and we are not fighting a few little boats, but massive criminal enterprises.

I support any moves to put a stop to this appalling illegal trade in human misery. After all, every boat represents an unsafe and illegal trade in human life.

Finally, let me touch on what life is shaping up to be following our amazing vaccine rollout. We should not govern by fear and liberty must be restored with lockdown ending– however, that is contingent on people doing the right thing and getting

the vaccine. I am not happy about the idea of domestic passports, and I have made this view known to the government – we need to balance safety and liberty. However, everyone has a duty to each other by getting the vaccine. After all, returning to lockdown is unthinkable, so we all need to be willing to do our bit. I do feel that Covid passports for international travel is valid for the time being on the grounds as we need to protect ourselves from foreign and new variants.

I hope that wisdom on the part of the younger generation will get them to take up the vaccine offer, which makes it easier for me to oppose passports for domestic settings.

So hope that gives you a flavour of my views on some of the issues that many people are interested in at the moment. ## **Your County Councillor**

The last three months since my last article have been interesting. I have now settled back into Essex County Council and it's refreshing to have an active District Councillor, Andy Baker, chasing me to do things in his ward. I have dealt with several highway problems he brought to me from residents, added three local highway panel schemes and had two ward walks to discuss the issues that we will need to work together on. Eastcliff Ward is lucky to have him.

My number one priority remains the flooding of Pickers Ditch at Sladburys Lane which also regularly floods the Happy Valley Bowling Club. Working with Cllr Baker, we had the roads swept ahead of a gulley (drains to you and me) clearance and jetting. My new highways buddy thinks this will solve the problem, but alas, we know it won't, been there and done that! Not to be deterred, I have finally managed to get an onsite visit with Natasha King, the Environment Agency representative for our area. Hopefully, this will stop the procrastinating around getting Picker's Ditch dredged, which incidentally, is classified as a river. I'll update you on how that meeting went in the next edition.

On the 29th of June the HRA had a quarterly meeting and I, along with Cllr Baker, gave reports on the work we had done. There was also a presentation by Dr Farrukh Shamshad who runs Kennedy Way. Now I don't know your thoughts on Kennedy Way, but my personal perspective is that, while it is having teething problems, it is a vast improvement from what came before. That said, there is room for improvement and the best way for us to voice our concerns is through a Patient Participation Group (PPG). My understanding is that Kennedy Way doesn't have one at the moment and I will be working with Dr Shamshad and the practice manager to get one up and running as soon as possible. Hopefully, in the next issue, I will be able to report back on the success of that.

Lastly, I went litter picking with the Holland Litter Pickers on the 4th of August. I had a good walk around with one of the organisers. On our travels, I came across varying issues such as low hanging branches, serious path defects, several blocked drains and bushes growing across the path. I took pictures to report later but it still surprises me when residents don't raise these issues themselves. So, as I love making work for myself, can I please ask that you get in contact with me about any issue you have in your street, if we don't report them they will never be fixed.

## Your District Councillor

This is my first full report since being elected and I have been quite busy over the last three months.

I have joined the Tendring Independent Group and now sit on the Planning Committee as well as the HR and Council Tax Committee.

At my first Planning Meeting on the 8th June, coincidentally my birthday!, my first job was to put forward objections to the Sladburys Lane application, the main one being about the potential risk of putting even more water into Pickers Ditch and a holding pond behind the houses in Sladburys Lane. Thankfully the Committee listened and have deferred that matter until they receive more detail to then make an informed decision.

I have also had meetings with officers from TDC about improvements on Eastcliff Field, including a new fence, some picnic style tables at the top end, and better waste bins. I am hoping a lot will have been done by the winter.

I have also been pushing for something permanently to be done about the continual fly tipping occurring at the Valley Road Recycling area. I am reporting fly tipping twice a week on average. I have asked for CCTV to be put in and evidence to be gathered to prosecute those who can be identified. It is not likely to be a quick fix, but it is one of my priorities.

I have received several enquiries from residents around issues personal to them, which I have dealt with as best I can, along with a number contacting about speeding in the area, and not just in my Ward. I was fortunate to be able to ask the police to undertake some enforcement recently and joined them for an hour or so on Kings Parade. I am glad to say only 2 vehicles out of possibly a hundred or more, were stopped for speeding. This is something I will be asking them to do on a more regular basis.

The flooding in Sladburys Lane and Pickers Ditch is also an issue that needs to be dealt with, and together with our County Councillor, Mark Stephenson, this is now our top priority to try and resolve.

I have also been out on a regular basis with the Volunteer Litter Picking Group on a Wednesday, around both Eastcliff and Holland. I have also been out around our beaches on several evenings to clear up anything that has been left behind, which has unfortunately included disposable BBQs, from not only the beach, but also Eastcliff field, all of which were still warm!
