There was an initial meeting with the Wildlife Trust and we identified this area as an ideal spot. Several years ago one of our previous Chairmen, Richard Walker, had advanced plans for a garden but sadly the plans never came to fruition. Helping Hedgehogs



As the nights start to get shorter and the weather (hopefully) starts to warm up, Britain's Favourite Wild Mammal, the hedgehog, will start



to wake up from hibernation. During hibernation their bodies cool and their heart rates drops to just a faint 20 beats per minute. Their body temperature which is normally 35°C drops to 10° or less and they only breathe about once every few minutes. They will have spent the winter tucked up in nests made of dry leaves, grass and other vegetation maybe under hedges or piles of wood, inside compost heaps or under sheds or decking.

So don't be too tidy in the garden in the spring. Be careful when doing that first cut of the grass – keep an eye out for any unusual mounds in the grass or hedge bases and check them carefully for sleeping hedgehogs before you get out the mower. Don't go raking carelessly through any piles of leaves which could be prime hibernation spots for hedgehogs. If a corner of your garden has gone a bit wild over the winter, why not leave it to provide some shelter for wildlife and a habitat for the invertebrates that hedgehogs feed on.

This is a key time for hedgehogs; they need to replenish their fat reserves after their long winter sleep so food will be the first thing on their agenda. From mid-March onwards (depending on the weather) you might start seeing signs of hedgehog activity. If they wake early, natural foods (beetles, caterpillars, worms etc.) can still be a bit scarce. So now is the time to start putting out supplementary food and water for them again. Offer meaty cat, dog or

hedgehog food or dry cat biscuits alongside a shallow dish of fresh water each night.

Once they've eaten and drunk, the next thing will be the need to find a mate. So make sure your garden and your neighbours' gardens are linked up to make a "hedgehog highway". The more gardens that you can link up the greater the chance of hedgehogs being able to meet up. It only needs a 13cm square gap at the bottom to allow a hedgehog through and once you've created your hedgehog highway you can log it on the BIG Hedgehog Map at www.bighedgehogmap.org - the map also accepts sightings of hedgehogs! Hopefully come the summer the next generation of

hoglets will be out and about in your garden and the cycle can begin again.





When television arrived in Holland on Sea ...

As we sit at home watching our (in many cases very large) flat screen televisions, seeing the world come into our living rooms (or even every room in the house), it is easy to forget that it wasn't that long ago that Holland on Sea had no real television service.

As Little Holland expanded into Holland on Sea, many an evening would see local families gathered around the radio listening to 2LO, which was replaced with the British Broadcasting Corporation Home, Third and Light programmes. But way back in 1922 the BBC started experimenting, in London, with a new form of entertainment – television. Whilst regular broadcasts started in November 1936 from Alexander Palace in London, the Second World War put a halt to it all

and the television service closed until 1946. Of course much of the United Kingdom was unable to receive these transmissions but it was found that there was a chance for the Holland residents being able to tune in if they erected a very large H aerial on a very tall pole, but then they also had to be able to afford the cost of a television – some £111, which equates to around £6,500 in today's money; a considerable amount when the average annual earnings in 1947 was £322!

Slowly, around Holland, these large H aerials started appearing and the local electrical shop, Hazelton's of Kings Avenue, added televisions to its wide range of wireless models. In those days the television transmissions were of 405 lines on VHF (Very High Frequency)

resulting in a less sharp picture, prone to atmospheric conditions, so on occasions the signal was far from satisfactory; viewing was further interrupted by cars and motorcycles that had insufficient suppressors on their electrics, so causing jagged lines across the screen and a rasping noise from the speaker.

All this did not deter those determined residents from watching the few hours broadcast each evening. The BBC gradually expanded its television service but on 22 September 1955 the first commercial television station went on air in competition to the BBC; Associated Rediffusion launched its weekday service to the London area, with Associated Television (ATV) taking over for the weekends. The signal came from Croydon and the enterprising Holland residents were soon erecting multi-dipole aerial, sometimes two stacked side by side, to receive this new kid on the block. Whilst the programming was entertaining the news was all focused on the London area.

Independent television began to spread across the country and on 27 October 1959 the newly constructed television

aerial mast at Mendlesham started putting out the programmes of Anglia Television, and Holland on Sea received a good signal, plus local news. There was a rush to buy television sets, and the aerial required to receive the new service as, whilst London's signal were of vertical polarisation, the Anglia signal was transmitted horizontally; in simple terms the householder's aerial bars went from side to side to receive Anglia, the aerial itself pointing roughly Norwich way, whilst the London bars went up and down and the aerial had to point to Croydon.

Less than a year later Southern Television opened its Dover transmitter and the good folk of Holland could now also receive this station, provided they added a further aerial pointing across the water. Surprisingly quite a number of residents did strap all these aerials onto one pole and then had a choice of BBC (one channel only at this point), Anglia, Rediffusion/ATV, and Southern.

The down side was that in strong winds the aerial array could likely come crashing down. The BBC was mindful that its television signal to Holland on Sea and surrounding area was not good (still coming primarily from Alexander Palace) and in May 1962 opened a relay station at Manningtree.

Just as the average Holland viewer settled down to one local BBC and one local ITV station (with just a modest aerial) along came BBC 2 on the new 625 UHF band, requiring a new television set and a totally different aerial. Yet again, when it started, there was no decent reception in Holland and the new 625 aerials had to be pointed to London. An improved service came in 1968 when the Sudbury transmitter started radiating BBC 2, and two




With a camera firmly focused on the Tower Television caption, this was the closest the station ever got to actually transmitting.

years later BBC 1 and Anglia were also beamed from Sudbury, to a much appreciative Holland audience; colour also now being part of the service.

However, in 1965 a local businessman, Eric Sullivan, who was later to open Edensor Care Home in Clacton, announced that a new commercial television station was going to be broadcast from the Sunk Head Tower. about 9 miles off the Holland on Sea. coast. The East Essex Gazette reported that at 4:20 a.m. on Tuesday 9th November a weak test transmission had been received at Walton: in truth this was not the case but a fake story ploy by the station owners to encourage investment. The plans came to nothing and Tower TV sunk into the North Sea abvss: the Sunk Head Tower being blown up by the marines, under government instruction, on 21st August 1967.

Another attempt at a commercial television station that would provide the Holland residents with a further choice

came in 1970 when the former owner of Radio Caroline, Ronan O'Rahilly claimed to be starting Caroline TV from a Super Constellation aircraft flying at 20,000 feet above the North Sea; after much hype the project failed to materialise.

Sadly the regional independent television stations basically morphed into one national company, the area gained Channels 4 and 5, and all this has subsequently been superseded by digital television with the belief that quantity far outweighs quality. So, as you flick from one channel to the next, trying to avoid being bombarded by the wealth of advertising, think back some 70 years to the excitement of a few Holland on Sea households as they managed to pick-up a grainy picture of Annette Mills and Muffin the Mule – how far we have come...or have we?

Tendring Specialist Stroke Services

The stroke service supports people discharged from hospital with a range of therapies, to re-adjust to the challenges post stroke. Our counselling service is vital for the huge mental impact of having a stroke and how this affects a person. Those who access our services will benefit from the expertise of the neuro-physiotherapy team and our stroke rehab nurse.

Essex Recycling Centres

From Monday 13th March you will have to book a slot online in advance to visit an Essex County Council recycling centre.

Pedestrians and blue badge holders will be exempt from this requirement.

Essex County Council is introducing this, initially as a trial system, as it says that demand can be managed better.

When arriving with your rubbish, you must produce your booking confirmation and proof of address. Essex County Council says that anyone who should have booked and has not done so will be turned away.

Although not stated in its information leaflet, the website does say this:

"If you have limited internet or accessibility issues that may restrict you from booking your slot online, there are alternative options to book a slot. In the first instance, could you receive assistance from a friend, family member, colleague, carer or neighbour? Alternatively, you can phone the Essex County Council contact centre on 0345 743 0430 Monday to Friday, 8:30am to 5:00pm who will make the booking on your behalf."



Surgery News



Kennedy Way Medical Centre has continued to face challenges including a shortage of staff and increased demand over the winter period. The practice has experienced large volumes of calls into the practice and we kindly ask patients to bear with us and to please use other communication avenues such as our surgery website (www.kennedyway.co.uk) or by using the practice email address (neecg.kennedywaymedicalcentre@nhs.net).

The practice has welcomed new members of the reception team who are undergoing training to support the existing team. We would like to congratulate two of our receptionists, Danielle who has moved into the role of Health Care Assistant and Courtney who has moved into the role of PCN GP Assistant. These additional roles will support the practice and team to improve access and services for our patients.

Clacton Community Practices (CCP) underwent a CQC inspection in September last year and the report is available on the CQC website. The report for CCP which includes Kennedy Way Medical Centre and Green Elms Health Centre in Jaywick showed an overall rating of 'requires improvement'. The inspectors acknowledged the amount of improvement made since the last inspection but there were some areas which required some action. To address these areas the practice has established a Quality Improvement Team who are working with an action plan. If you have any questions regarding the report, please email the Kennedy Way email address.

The practice has seen a low uptake of flu vaccinations for this season. The flu vaccination is safe and effective, and it is offered to all those that are at risk of getting seriously ill from flu. The practice will be offering flu vaccines until the end of March 2023, please contact the practice to book an appointment or ask at the practice during your consultation. GP practices offer flu vaccines every year between September and March. The practice also offers Pneumonia and Shingles vaccines to those at risk throughout the year, please contact the surgery if you would like more information or to book a vaccine.

Kennedy Way Community Garden

FRUIT trees have been planted at a community garden to join raised flower beds, vegetable planters and a polytunnel for seedlings.

A new wildflower garden is also in creation at the Kennedy Way Community Garden in Clacton, run by Community Voluntary Services Tendring (CVST).

It comes after a recycling hub and community hub were installed on the site, which are due to open soon, providing space for more activities to take place at the garden.

Nicola Vella, volunteer co-ordinator at CVST, said: "The community garden is always busy with projects and ideas.

"On Thursday, two apple trees were planted, which in the future will add to the fruit and vegetables the garden already produces thanks to the incredible volunteers.

"The Men's Shed volunteers have also started a new project creating flat pack bird boxes and growing boxes.

"But we do need more volunteers to come and help at the garden, to help us maintain this wonderful site and really make it the best it can be.

"It's such a lovely space and a few hours here can really help your own wellbeing as well as the garden."



Donations of rocks are also needed to create a new rockery, soil for planting, and dry, clean plywood for the Men's Shed.



Kennedy Way

Community Garden is the result of a unique collaboration between the Suffolk and North East Essex Integrated Care System Local Estates Forum, the North East Essex Health and Wellbeing Alliance, site owners NHS Property Services and CVST.

Phase one of the garden, which included a Men's Shed, grassed area, outside gym and raised beds, opened in October 2021.

Work on phase two began last year, which has so far included the new community hub, recycling hub, and extensions to accessible pathways.

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
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
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

Parliament Update

Dear Holland-on-Sea residents.

I hope that you all had a wonderfully Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

I find myself completely reinvigorated and ready to champion the causes that truly matter to us in the consistency of Clacton.

It is with great pleasure that I can announce that Tendring District Council will be in receipt of nearly £20 million from the Levelling Up Fund to rejuvenate Clacton town centre. This is the result of hard work and determination from Tendring District Council and me to keep banging the drum for Clacton at every opportunity and emphasising the need to level up sideways, not just up and down the country. We will see more businesses opened, more jobs created, and brand-spanking new community hubs in the town centre. This is a fantastic achievement and I am glad that the ministers finally listened to my pleas. It also ties very nicely into the opportunities being created at Freeport East, the announcement of which I attended a couple of weeks ago. This will be a major employer in our region, and I recently drove the Chairman and Chief Executive of the Freeport around the constituency of Clacton for a tour and to show where investment is greatly needed. I believe that the long-term prosperity created by the Freeport will truly level up our communities.

I am out and about every Friday in Clacton, from meeting with the Council and stakeholders to holding my regular surgeries in my constituency office. I've also been holding doorstep surgeries where I come to your neighbourhood and knock on the door to offer any help that I can. The Deputy PFCC for Essex recently came with me to the Council to discuss issues with protecting vulnerable people. We absolutely have to offer more support to those in need, and not let them fall through the safety net.

I'm also holding the Government to account over the issue of illegal migration. I have suggested that the Ministry of Defence takes over from the Home Office, and that we put British boots on the ground in France, rather than paying the French Government which continues to usher boats to UK shores. If they won't stop them, I know our troops will.

The brief cold snap, a few weeks ago, has made some new potholes which I will be reporting as I come across them. For the most part, my Division is relatively clear with only a few dotted around. If you think your pothole hasn't been dealt with please get in touch and I can look into it.

The ridiculous decision to bring a booking system to our recycling centres has to be one of the worst decisions ECC has made since I have been a councillor. It's early days at the time of writing and I am unsure what can be done to reverse this situation. I will be talking to my colleagues to see what pressure can be put on the Tories to reverse this apparently random and ill-conceived decision. It's because of this and several other budgetary decisions that I will not be supporting the proposed council budget later this month.

I'm currently pushing for a big path scheme to be done in Holland. It looks promising and I hope to tell you more in the next edition. I have to get it over the financial year threshold and so will hold off giving specifics for now.

I am also working with Hedingham Buses which is having staffing issues and is unable to keep to bus timetables. I'm pushing for a priority on school routes as I think it's hard enough for our school children without the added hassle of their bus not turning up.

Finally, District Elections will soon be upon us and so it feels only right to mention them. The most important thing to mention is a new law requiring voter ID. This page isn't big enough for me to go into detail about what is needed but you can find everything you need by typing "voter ID explanation" into google or failing that please give me a call.

I will be supporting Cllr Baker as before and two new candidates for St Barts, so look out for my endorsement.

Well, so much for a mild winter! In my last article for the December issue I mentioned there might be a mild winter to come, well I was wrong about that, what with snow in places, and below freezing temperatures, which has meant the heating had to go up a notch. I am hoping that you are all keeping well and warm in the days where we seem to have a number of differing seasons all in the same day.

You may have noticed in the area above Gunfleet Sailing Club that planting of shrubs has taken place, and bark covering put down. I had also asked that the area be tidied up, including the removal of old rock and tarmac, which has been done, which is the reason for the orange tape around the area. As this was done, some brickwork has been exposed, and as it was uncertain what was underneath, I met with officers to discuss the way forward. Top soil will be put in, and the area re-seeded, and if this does not take, further discussions will take place about an alternative, so that the area can be a fitting reminder of our late Queen.

I am very grateful to a local resident, and the local history society, for informing me that during World War Two there were two 6 inch naval guns in that position, and subsequently a shelter which was removed due to gale damage and irreparable wear and tear.

There still have been no decisions around the potential development/sale of green open spaces, and as I have said before, I will fight with every tool available, to prevent any development on these precious green open spaces in Holland on Sea.

In 2021/2022 I pushed TDC to apply for funding, from the Government, for Changing Places Toilets, and am pleased to say that not only was funding of £300,000 pounds obtained, but that two of the three funded, will be placed in Holland on Sea and Eastcliff. The locations are at Holland Haven on the seafront, and near to Beaches Café. Both were granted planning permission in December, and I am hoping that they will be in place and functioning by the end of this financial year.

On the 4th May local elections will take place across Tendring for District Councillors. This year will be the first time that voters attending polling stations will have to show a photographic identity document, in order to vote. Further information can be found here: Voter ID | Electoral Commission. I am informed that there is no change to postal votes.

In the last magazine I mentioned that our green spaces were under threat and that our organisation replied quickly by writing to the leader of Tendring District Council. A part of his reply was that: "...although the Property Dealing Procedure has been initiated it doesn't mean that any of the land in Holland will be recommended for sale/development. If however, after careful consideration of all the factors it is decided to recommend this course, there will be the opportunity for you, *your members*, and other residents in Holland on Sea...to put forward any support or objections for whatever is proposed..."

I have italicised part of his reply for a reason. In his reply, Cllr Stock acknowledges our organisation. We need as many members as possible. If these plans should proceed, the HRA will be well placed to oppose them by having a strong membership.

The Local Authority elections are in May. As a non-political organisation we shall offer to work with whomever is elected in our wards. However, whether it be about the proposed development of green spaces or any other matter, our councillors will have far more clout by knowing that they are supported by a robust and numerous membership.

So, if you have not yet joined us or have not yet renewed your membership, please do so.

The following are extracts from the constitution of the HRA:

- a) At the Annual General Meeting all the officers and members of the Executive Committee, other than the President, shall retire, but be eligible for re-election without nomination.
- b) Any Two Full Members of The Association may propose any other candidate or candidates for office by notice in writing to the Hon. Secretary or the Chairman not less than seven clear days prior to the Annual General Meeting, such written nominations being endorsed with the written consent of the nominees.
- c) The Executive Committee elected at the Annual General Meeting shall themselves elect a Chairman (and Vice Chairman if required) at the next Executive Committee meeting.

and

a) Any Full Member of The Association as set out in Rule 2 may submit a motion for consideration at the Annual General Meeting. Any such motion must be seconded by another Full Member and submitted in writing to the Honorary Secretary or Chairman not less than seven clear days prior to the Annual General Meeting.

HRA MEETINGS - WHY WE INVITE LOCAL COUNCILLORS

We hold meetings quarterly at Holland Public Hall in January, April, July and October. Except for April's meeting which is for members and associate members only, meetings are open to all residents.

We were able to resume public meetings in April 2021 and as a matter of course, we have always invited local councillors. Since April 2021 we have held seven meetings. Cllr Stephenson has missed one meeting (owing to a prior commitment). Cllr Baker has attended all meetings. Cllr Winfield has attended one meeting and Cllr King has not attended any. At every meeting, members of the audience have welcomed the input from those councillors who attended and many have expressed regret at not being able to question all local councillors. Cllrs King and Winfield are not members of the HRA and do not represent the HRA. They are members of a separate political group. However, it is our policy to invite all local councillors to all meetinas.

The HRA is a non-political organisation. We believe that residents should know what their councillors are doing and which is why we invite all of the councillors. It does not matter whether they are affiliated to a party, are Independent, or members of a group.

All of our meetings are free so if you have an interest in the community, then please come along. We hope to see you.

Did you know that you can find out how often our councillors attend council meetings? Local elections are on 4th May and this information may help you to decide how you use your vote.

You can get this information on www.tendringdc.gov.uk then go to council>council democracy>your councillors.

Council elections are on 4th May. You MUST present acceptable photo ID when voting. The following is an extract from the website of the electoral commission and we have included just some of the most common forms of ID.

"Anyone voting at a polling station in England this May will need to show photo ID before they can be given their ballot paper".

These are some of the accepted forms of photo ID:-

Passport

Driving Licence

A Blue Badge

Older/Disabled Person's Bus Pass

You will only need to show one form of photo ID. It needs to be the original version and not a photocopy.
