# What changes in Store at Holland on Sea?

Mention the shops at Holland on Sea and the tendency will be to think of Kings Avenue and the parade from there to Queensway, but back as far as the late 1920's a lockup shop on the corner of York Road and Holland Main Road (now known as Frinton Road) was opened. Run by Miss M Squires and her sister, it was known as The Empire Stores and sold confectionary, stationery and tobacco, plus newspapers; later its name changed to Harvey and Harris. The shop was demolished in 1964 when a modest new shop complex was built, running down York Road, with flats above. Many Holland residents will look back with fond memories of Adlingtons, that resided where Harvey and Harris were; a place you could always guarantee to find a rather special box of chocolates amongst many other things. On the opposite side of York Road was Model Farm Dairy, set in a guite imposing detached property, which also included a cafe, selling delicious Eldorado ice cream. The dairy was the base for milk delivery and immediately behind the building were the stables for the "horse" power, pulling the milk floats.

The horses "Queenie" and "Tom" became a familiar, and popular, sight round the village; the animals, as well as delivering milk, also offered a handy source of nutrition to one's rhubarb but being creatures of habit, tended to favour certain areas! The dairy became Taskers, dealing in lawn mower repairs, then a DIY shop before being demolished; making way for residential flats. Just eastward of Empire Stores was Kingsbury's Empire Fisheries, run by Mr. A W Kingsbury

and, more recently, the Smith Brothers. Beyond there, as a later addition, there was a hardware store, with all three businesses being separated by waste land at the time; residential properties were built around the time the corner was developed.

On the opposite side of Holland Main Road a group of shops were built, in the mid 1930's, and known as York Buildings, having living accommodation above them. The shop on the corner was Tuck's Stores, a high-class grocers, with cooked ham a speciality: subsequently adding a post office to their services, with the entrance in Stratford Road. Some years later it became T A Peppin and continued selling groceries, whilst eventually the post office became an independent business. In more recent years this corner shop became the Holland Bed Centre before its change of use, firstly to selling printer ink cartridges, and finally as the base for a catering company.

The neighbouring business was the Wool Shop, run by Miss Yerall, with its 'of the time' art deco sign board. Taken over by Miss Wiles, this shop continued right though until the turn of the century and, on change of ownership and trade, a friend rescued the

original sign from a skip and it now resides in their loft. Since then, the shop has been a delicatessen - Moyles, a dental laboratory, a florist and currently trading in cosmetics. Moving eastward we came to Coffee at Eleven, and you might well be mistaken in thinking it was a form of cafe. The Misses Nicholls initially operated the shop as a circulating library where, for 2d (less than 1p) per week, you could borrow "a really catholic selection of works by the leading writers of the day; whether a biography, a technical book, or the latest thriller". You were also invited to survey their stocks of stationery, cigarettes, ladies compacts and many other useful articles suitable for presents, prizes, etc. By the late 1940's the shop had been taken over by E E Pollard and whilst it remained Coffee at Eleven, the book side was now known as Pollard's Library, and in order to satisfy the hobby of reading, offered over 7,000 titles, claiming to have the most comprehensive selection of books in the district. Visitors to Holland on Sea could also enjoy the loan of a best seller on payment of a small deposit. Subsequently run by Mrs Belcham its owners changed to Mr and Mrs Bert Kennell in 1954: the author remembers

buying a toy fishing rod there and trying his luck in Holland Brook but the fish weren't biting at the time! The shop went on to become, what is now, Windmill Bakers.

Continuing eastward there was F G Roberts the Butcher – purveyors of best grade meat. By the mid 1950's the butchers and poulterers were under the ownership of G F Guyver. More recently, as Malcolm's, it had a reputation for its marvellous range of flavoured sausages that won many prizes; continuing to this day as Frinton Road Butchers. The final shop in the block was Ambrose Stores, trading in groceries and greengroceries, it was later to become Rowlands Stores, continuing in the grocery/ greengrocery line before briefly becoming an off-license, and now the base for the sale of swimming pools and hot tubs.

Heading round the corner and down Stratford Road, next to the Post Office were three lock-up shops – the first was a greengrocers, run by Alec Blandford, but he moved his business, after a few years, to another lock-up opposite what is now the Tavern, and a small tea room, known as Betty's, opened. The second shop was a ladies hairdressers called Peggy, run by Mrs. M A Heightman; this subsequently becoming Stellas. Changing its clientele it became a barbers

– Colin's. The final lock-up was B & B Shore Repairers, which was to remain as such until the 1990's, when it closed. Colin moved his tonsorial business into the now vacated shoe repairers, and the former barbers, once again became a ladies hairdressers. The post office had, for some time, expanded into what was Betty's Tea Rooms.

So, just a small parade of shops but with a fascinating story of serving the good folk of Holland on Sea for almost a century.

### **Kennedy Way Surgery News**



By the time the last magazine went out guite a lot of things had moved on.

Two further GPs have started. There are now 4 permanent GPs, one locum covering maternity leave and a further locum who works one day per week. This means that there are at least two GPs on duty every day. The surgery also has Advanced Nurse Practitioners (ANPs) who offer appointments each day.

Two new initiatives are planned for the coming months. A new team of ANPs will be responsible for a full clinical triage of all patients. This will hopefully get patients to the appropriate person and allow GPs to deal with patients with on-going chronic problems. It is hoped that this will mean that patients will be able to see the same GP each time. Also, a second team led by a further new GP will be responsible for dealing with housebound patients and those in Care Homes.

There are so many clinicians working at the surgery each day that they are running out of rooms to accommodate them. The surgery is therefore looking into reconfiguring the waiting area in order to create two new consulting rooms. An area upstairs will be used by some of the admin staff.

We are aware that some patients are still struggling to get through on the telephone and as a result feel that they have been left behind in terms of being able to make an appointment. Unfortunately, BT has still not provided the infrastructure to enable the phones (which have been in place for at least 6 months) to operate. The surgery keeps pressing but it is outside their control.

Two new prescription clerks started in December and as a result the old prescription helpline has been reinstated. When patients telephone they will be offered the opportunity to go directly to this line and leave a message. This means that fewer patients will join the general queue.

The management are trying really hard to make this surgery safe and welcoming. Watch this space.

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#### TENDRING TALKING TIMES OVERVIEW FOR volunteers

We often have vacancies (some now) in the Tendring Talking Times team, based in their own premises in Church Road. Clacton. Here we have the Editing room, the Readers' recording room, the Technical and Engineers room, and the kitchen which doubles up for complementary cups of coffee and tea and office, and of course the toilet. We have disability electric chairlift for use on the stairs.

The responsibilities range from being a team reader, one of 4, in the editing room and rotating one at a time on the microphone, the editor of the day, and the technical staff who record and transfer the spoken words onto memory sticks.

It is on a **Thursday** every week of the year when the nominated volunteers meet at 3.30 pm. The following information explains further:

Nominated Editor, and Readers in a team of 4 work on a 6 week rota system i.e. once every 6 weeks, finishing approx. 5.30 pm.

The Technical and Engineering staff have their own rota, and time for training new Volunteers who have this interest.

Also there is the task of unpacking the previous week's returned wallets for the next week by the volunteers as each address has two wallets one out and one in.

On the **Friday** morning at 7.00 am nominated volunteers check addresses and pack each memory stick into the special vinyl coloured addressed wallets, and pop them into post coded GPO sacks, which are then taken to the General Post Office in Oxford Road, Clacton. A new set of GPO sacks is collected for the following Thursday and returned to our office for the following week which ensures each address has the continuation of a memory stick.

## **Your County Councillor**

Well, this is a bit embarrassing. This was supposed to be my final letter to you as your County Councillor. I was standing down in Holland-on-Sea due to a recent boundary change. That however has become old news. In December, The Leader of Essex County Council, Kevin Bentley asked the council to endorse his request to apply to Government to postpone elections for a year (the maximum term you can apply for). In all the time I have been at County Hall I have never seen Conservatives and Labour vote together on any major issue until now. I was one of 14 Councillors who voted against what I believe to be a very undemocratic position. Needless to say it passed and we currently await Government's response.

So why is this so important to us? Well, the only reason they could ask for the postponement was if they were considering Local Government Reform or LGR as it is more commonly known by its acronym. When Cllr Bentley applied for the postponement, he affectively started a clock ticking that will see the end of Tendring District Council in three years' time (May 28). The plan is to dissolve all 15 authorities in Essex and make anywhere between one to five unitaries. Likely this will see the merging of Braintree, Colchester and Tendring to form one large authority.

Whilst it will mean that we will finally have control of things like roads and education, I am concerned about the social services cost that seems to be causing a lot of financial pressure across councils in the UK. Added to that we are likely to lose 120 councillors across what I expect our unitary to be. In essence you would lose all your district councillors and be left with one person close to my current position. It's a lot for one person, not good for the residents in my opinion and hence the reason why I voted against it.

Time has moved on since then and there will be plenty to say on this in the upcoming months, not to mention my proposal for a parish/town council for Clacton and how that might impact Holland-on-sea. For now, as Leader of Tendring District Council I have to get the very best deal I can for Tendring residents.

Until then, unless something else changes, it looks like I will remain your County Councillor for a further three years, which hopefully is news well received. I will continue to work to improve the area of Holland-on-Sea, starting with a new pothole campaign to pick up those missed in the previous years' efforts.

As always, my door is always open.

### **Your District Councillor**

Soon the clocks will be going forward, the dark evenings will be a thing in the past, and we can now look forward to the spring and summer. The weather will hopefully be good as well.

I have been dealing with residents' enquiries, on issues across the Ward, reporting those where necessary, and also those that I have found while on a Ward walk, including the increase in fly tipping at Valley Road Recycling area. If the clothing recycling bins are, or appear to be full, leaving items in bags in front of them will not be treated as recycling, but fly tipping, and will therefore end up in landfill.

As I stated in the last magazine, we will be holding Councillor Surgeries in 2025, and these have now been booked for the Committee room, at Holland Village Hall. There will only be four, as all of us usually attend the four HRA meetings as well. The dates are all on a Saturday, between 10am and 12 noon, and will be on 15th March, 17th May, 20th September and 15th November.

The earth 'bund' on Eastcliff will be, I am told, improved in the coming months, and a similar 'bund' is to be put in at the Lyndhurst Road/Hazlemere Road open space as well. This will mean the wooden posts being removed there as well. Other open space areas within Holland will also have something similar happening.

You will remember from my last report that I had asked our County Councillor, Mark Stephenson, to make enquiries as to when the pavements in Dulwich Road and Preston Road are likely to be resurfaced. Mark was asked about this issue at the last public meeting in January, and they are not going to be done. Highly disappointing, why Essex County Council could not have done all the roads adjacent to each other in one go is not understandable.

As you are all aware, I also deal with many issues involving the Portfolios I am responsible for, which from the beginning of this year are now Housing and Planning (as there has been a slight re-shuffle of responsibilities), which involve at least weekly meetings with senior officers, a monthly meeting with Housing Team Managers on all things Housing and Homelessness, as well as meeting with Cabinet colleagues on a frequent basis, as well as other Committee meetings I am connected to.

We have also been preparing for the Budget setting meetings over the last few weeks, which will be decided on Tuesday 11th February. Council Tax will be going up by 2.99% for Tendring, we have not yet seen the final figures from the County Council, or Police and Fire Crime Commissioner's office.

I could include more, but unfortunately I am constrained by space.
