Purple Pals



Ipswich Road

It was in March of last year when the volunteers started work at Ipswich Road. The original plan was to create a wildflower area and a woodland area. Bluebells were planted "in the green", which meant that they would bloom that same year. One year later and this spring not all that many bloomed. However, primroses and cowslips were added to that area and they should self-seed for next year.

The wildflower area was dug by removing the top layer of soil and the area is surrounded by interwoven twigs and branches. At the time of writing, there's a lot of growth and we're hoping that by summer there will be plenty of colour and insects buzzing around.

Perhaps the most striking area is against the former toilet block.

Members have worked hard to create a garden full of colour and variety. Quite a number of residents and volunteers have donated plants and one of our volunteers bought a substantial number of plants as a personal memorial.

The group has also created another garden in front of the bluebell area. This had been a hotchpotch of bramble, nettles and weeds. Our adviser from Essex Wildlife Trust advised us to leave it; however, this "hotchpotch" was mown





down by the lawnmower operator, so we stepped in and created another garden.

In addition, you may have noticed a couple of bug hotels with plants on top and a flowering cherry. We have asked the council for some seating and this has been promised.

The volunteers meet every Saturday at 10am for an hour. More helpers are needed and would be most welcome.



Holland on Sea The Aftermath of War

When peace arrived to this country, the residents of Holland on Sea, like their counterparts around the British Isles. celebrated in style; albeit in keeping with the rationing and limited facilities available. The Holland Ratepavers Association organised a children's party in the Village Hall when 150 young people assembled for a variety of games and sports. The adults also celebrated at the Hall with a dance and social function, with the music of Miss Alice St. John's Dance Band. However, the euphoria was short lived as, whilst peace brought an end to the hostilities, the reality of "the state of the nation" stared everyone in the face. As well as the damage of enemy action, it was apparent that those properties in Holland on Sea commandeered by the forces, during the turbulent six years, had not been particularly carefully looked after. Then there were the years of neglect by the authorities whose attentions had been forcibly diverted to more pressing matters. And, unlike many areas, the village's seafront location, directly across the North Sea from the enemy, meant a number of anti-invasion measures along the coastline. Whilst the barbed wire and

scaffold was obvious, and the pill boxes were unattractive features, it was the minefields that held the greatest concern. All this was the result of the war, but one thing that needed urgent attention, that was particularly unique to Holland, was the state of the sea defences, or lack of them. It wasn't all "doom and gloom" though, as the Village Hall itself, used for the peacetime celebrations, had just been acquired and was formally opened by the local MP – Stanley Holmes; Holland on Sea also now had its own public library, as part of the Hall, and the Holland on Sea Social Club was formed.

With a mass of clearing-up around the whole country the removal of the wartime defences appeared slow, and barbed wire was visible in 1946; two years later it lay, piled up, still waiting to be taken away. The removal of mines was a more delicate affair. Despite the official sweeping of areas by the military, to ensure all nonactivated mines were removed, it did not always appear that the number of these, plus those recorded as having been activated, equated to the total recorded as laid: a clearance certificate was not. therefore, always issued and areas remained closed until far later than was considered reasonable

In 1946 it was declared that the beach from York Road to Holland Haven was now clear for public use. Gun emplacements were removed; the one at Star Point was blown-up and the remaining concrete boulders rolled down the cliff to the west of the Point where they formed the base of the sailing club boat enclosure, opened in 1951. Clacton Urban District Council turned its attention to the state of the seafront, having suspended the initial work it had started after taking responsibility for Holland from Tendring Rural District

Council, in 1934. The many privately constructed sea walls, which had protected the ragged cliffs and been used to support beach huts, were now in various states of collapse, the huts themselves had either gone or were beyond repair. An inspection of the many refreshment pavilions along the seafront, from First Avenue through to the Haven, painted a very sorry picture. Two had been used during the conflict, for housing concrete pill boxes, and all had seen a lack of repair and maintenance, resulting in neglect and decay.

What had been Fiddle Fish Cafe was beyond hope and any remains were completely removed. Similarly the refreshment station below Sea Lane was wrecked by cliff slips and could only be dismantled. Adjacent to Kings Avenue, the former amusement pavilion now housed a pill box and whilst the structures themselves were removed, the piles were left in situ. The bathing station, just to its east, was in a sorry way and the building and piles were cleared away. Faring much better was the refreshment station below Queensway which was restored to its former glory and continued to serve the public until 1984. Finally, the refreshment pavilion below York Road, also now containing a concrete pill box, was taken away, leaving a solid set of piles which, sadly were never to carry another structure; these heavy wooden piles remained, at both sites, until 1968.

Meanwhile, the Council was investing in a housing development in the Chase, plus other stock which was built in vacant plots, amongst privately constructed properties in Kings Avenue, Bedford, and Salisbury Road. But any new build was hampered as the government had placed restrictions on the number of buildings being allowed in each area due to a shortage of materials. However, it was possible to negotiate an increase in numbers with another authority if they had not used all their allocation.

Surgery News



We now welcome a new permanent Practice Manager Sandra Coxell.

We and the surgery management are very aware that the telephone appointment system has created many problems in recent months. The ASKMYGP system (which should alleviate the problem) was once again delayed. This was due to some national litigation which prevented the Integrated Care Board purchasing the relevant software. The surgery is now working towards installing what is necessary including a new web site. This should be almost identical to the one we currently use and patients will still be able to order prescriptions as well as being able to contact the surgery on-line.

As previously stated, patients that can, will be able to use the on-line system for appointments and information. Those who cannot or do not wish to, can still phone at ANY time of day and a member of staff will enter the appointment or information request on their behalf. This system is now working very well at Ranworth surgery and has reduced the number of telephone calls per day significantly.

At our last meeting the issue of having to provide identification to receive a copy of blood test results was raised and this is now no longer necessary.

Are We Drinkng Enough Water

Summer is now here and we see a lot of people carry around their water bottles, but are they still drinking enough water?

Ideally, we should be drinking 1.5l-2l of water a day more if we are exercising and sweating or are losing water from vomiting or diarrhoea. This would be the equivalent of 7-8 cups a day.

The shops are filled with ranges of fancy waters and energy drinks all offering health benefits. A lot contain additives which can act as a diuretic; therefore, we pass more urine than usual having a dehydrating effect.

A common symptom of low water intake is fatigue, if you are looking to boost your energy levels during the day, consider having a glass of water.

Keeping hydrated is important for our cells, helps to regulate body temperature, normalising blood pressure, supports kidney function, is important for good bowel movement to eliminate waste, helps to avoid constipation. When we eat, water in saliva helps chewing and breaking down food. Water forms part of our mucus which helps to protect our respiratory, urinary, reproductive, and digestive tracts.

If you are trying to lose weight swop out the sugary drinks and drink a large glass of water prior eating, this will create the feeling of fullness. Avoid drinking fluid with a meal as this can dilute your stomach acid and make the breakdown of food more difficult resulting in symptoms including bloating.

Our bodies are approximately 70% water. The water we drink and consume in food is essential to help bring in nutrients and take away waste. There is a high content of water in Fruit and Vegetables 70 -80%, even bread can contain 40% water.

Suggestions to stay hydrated.

Carry a water bottle with you and use it.

Get into a routine of drinking water first thing in the morning and prior to meals.

Add slices of fresh lemon, lime, herbs, various fruits

Try different teas – Green, Mint, Ginger, Rooibos

Make fresh vegetable juices.





Your County Councillor

I must admit to loving the spring months, heralding what I hope to be a glorious sunny summer. It also makes me far more upbeat and allows me to fully appreciate just what I have right on my doorstep. My efforts to improve the area will continue.

The year-long path resurfacing in part of Holland has now finished and, for the most part, is a success. I've had a few people mention when or why their paths haven't been done, and while I will take a look at some of these paths, it should be realised that this was the only major footpath scheme in Tendring last year, with nothing coming to Tendring this year. I'm pleased to have it happen in Holland-on-Sea. I know it caused some disruption for residents, but I hope that this will reduce the number of trips and falls that have such an impact on residents who live here.

In the last update, I mentioned I wouldn't be your Essex County Councillor at the next county election, and I would update you on this issue. Unfortunately, I can't. The boundary commission is still settling some boundaries. My stance has always been what works best for residents, and that seems to have been listened to. Some councillors, however, are not happy with the new boundaries as they may work against them in the next election and are currently trying to get them reorganised. I don't think they will have much luck, but you never know. I'll hopefully update you on the next issue.

Potholes are probably the thing I receive most emails on, and it's no surprise as ECC has been appalling. As I mentioned in the last issue, no work has been done on what was supposed to be a councillor-led scheme, and I have given up on chasing that as a new scheme was brought out last month. I have been out with all three councillors covering Holland-on-Sea and picked up the very worst potholes on all the major roads in the area. It wasn't too many, 12 in total, so I have also added potholes in Slade Road, Nansen and Chelmsford to the list. In theory, these will get done in the next six weeks, as I can now set the priority of what gets done in that time. Only time will tell if this new scheme works or if it fails like the last one did.

Please feel free to email me or any of your district councillors (emails are in the magazine) with any potholes in your road that you would like me to add to this list.

I have been busy working alongside Councillors Stephenson, Baker, and Smith in addressing resident concerns. The most common being potholes, concerns re bin collections, street lighting, housing, and overgrown greenery.

Our regular surgeries in conjunction with the HRA seems to be working well, and it is really lovely to meet with you and support you in finding solutions to your concerns. I am so pleased you take the time to come and see us.

As I sit on both council scrutiny committees, I have a real interest in how we work with partner organisations to try and improve local lives. This could include health, education, and homelessness. I have been able to meet with some of our homeless people and support the amazing work some local organisations are doing to reduce the anxiety and distress associated with homelessness. We truly do have some amazing people in our community. I have also been privileged to work with fellow councillors in looking into our local secondary schools and the reasons for absenteeism. Since the last magazine I have been out on Ward walks with Cllr Baker, Cllr Doyle and Cllr Stephenson to look at problems around the ward including the Haven focusing primarily on paving, potholes, litter and some of the alley ways in our Ward.

Issues that have been reported and are awaiting action. These include:

Lifebuoys: These have been checked and costed, along with putting a What 3 Words identifier on each position, this will be done some time in the current financial year.

Fishing on beaches: Tendring District Council are creating swim zones on flagged beaches. The "Bather Beaches" will be available as part of the beach management plan which will be on the TDC website once finalised.

There is a hole outside the Holland Bowls Club on the grass verge in Madeira Road. I would ask that residents are mindful of this hole if exiting your car onto the verge. (It has been reported)

Many road signs that we reported have been renewed. To my knowledge only Princes Road has gained an extra letter. This will be remedied soon.

I was asked about several areas that have paving issues. The only positive I can give on that currently is that Grenfell Avenue is on the ECC smaller capital footway program for 2024/2025.
